Dear Colorado Tourism Office:

As a concerned citizen of Colorado, I was recently surprised to discover that your "Let's Talk Colorado" vacation giveaway is being promoted by flooding the Internet with unsolicited mass email known as "spam". Because spam transmission is largely an endeavor of con artists, scammers, and criminals, I am worried about how this activity will taint the reputation of our state. I have started an investigation into this matter, so that stakeholders and interested parties can take the appropriate action to restore Colorado's good standing.

Spam is a serious problem on the Internet, as it not only decreases the usefulness of email with tens or hundreds of unwanted messages for every legitimate message, but it creates an unreasonable burden on our networks. Unlike junk mail sent through the postal service, spam does not contribute financially to the email infrastructure. As a software engineer who has developed email systems, I can attest that the majority of money and effort allocated to email services is spent on processing and filtering spam.

Over the past four months, I have received no fewer than fifteen unsolicited email messages promoting your vacation giveaway. These messages have been carefully crafted and sent using a variety of shady techniques in an attempt to bypass spam filters and avoid responsibility. My guess is that the Colorado Tourism Office has, with the best of intentions, hired a third party to help promote tourism and market the giveaway. This third party has taken it upon themselves to resort to spam, or has provided poor guidance to the Colorado Tourism Office with regards to the nature of such activity.

I have attached a copy of the most recent giveaway message I have received. The shady techniques employed by these mailings include the following:

1. Fifteen (15) such messages have been sent to my mailbox. If the message was legitimate, surely

one would suffice.

2. The URLs (web addresses) to which recipients are encouraged to visit change in every message. All of these URLs redirect to the letstalkcolorado.com web site. By using this method to disguise the address of the final web site, the senders hope to prevent spam filters from using the URL to filter the messages. These disguised URLs include the following:

Notice how many different domain names are employed to help with the disguise.

- 3. A gratuitous space has been inserted into the word "unsubscribe" to make it look like "unsubscribe". This is a another technique spammers use to avoid being blocked, as many spam filters will consider the presence of the word "unsubscribe" when judging if a message is spam.
- 4. Perhaps the most disturbing behavior, and a technique shared by many con artists, is the suspicious nature of the postal addresses supplied in the messages. These addresses use a series of mailboxes to give the impression of a legitimate business, while covering up their actual physical location. Additionally, this marketing company feels the need to change their name every so often. Names and addresses referenced in the messages I received include the following:

Please look into how this underhanded marketing is taking place. I love Colorado, and I hate to see our
name tarnished by negative publicity such as spam. If the Colorado Tourism Office is the victim of some
sort of scam involving these mailouts, then appropriate legal action should be taken against the
perpetrators. If a hired third party is responsible, business with them should cease. If there is some
justification for why these messages should not be considered spam, I would love to hear it, but it would
take some convincing after seeing how these people behave as if they are criminals - engaging in
misdirection, changing names, changing addresses, etc. Please provide some reassurance so I don't have
to pursue this matter any further.
